COUNSELING SERVICES

Licensed counselors help children, individuals, couples, and families with various relationship, behavioral, and mental health needs. In addition to in-office sessions, counseling services include an intensive outpatient program, school-based and in-home family therapy.

GRAND FORKS

In July, our Grand Forks office relocated to 4324 University Avenue, Suite B, Grand Forks. This upgraded space includes 16 individual therapist offices, a dedicated play therapy room equipped with an observation window, and a welcoming lobby area designed for children to play. The Village proudly hosted an open house on October 5th, welcoming the Grand Forks community to explore the new building.

An additional 500 sessions a year will now be available thanks to this new space!

One of our **exceptional** Village providers, Alyssa, initially started providing care for client Sam's son, Lennox, to address his anxiety-related sleep issues. Sadly, during their second appointment, Sam's husband, Cody, was confronted with the devastating news of his third cancer recurrence. This life-altering event prompted Alyssa to pivot and refocus the therapeutic approach to address the new challenges the family was facing.

Alyssa, an expert in her field, helped Lennox and Sam cope with their emotions individually and together as a family. Equipping Sam with tools to navigate their grief journey, Alyssa helped prepare Sam and Lennox for the unimaginable event of losing Cody, a loving husband, and father.

At The Village Family Service Center, we are committed to meeting our clients wherever they are in their journey and pride ourselves on our ability to adapt and progress alongside them. This impactful therapy **strengthened the bonds** between a mother and her son, showcasing the critical importance of our services and the urgent need for sustained support for mental health initiatives.



PROGRAM REVENUE (NET)




HOW FUNDS WERE SPENT
